Overview & Objectives:

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- We feel that in order for tango to continue to grow and further sustain itself it needs a balanced approach. This includes making available forms of music to dance to beyond the Golden Age, including promoting and hosting live music.
- It's also important for us because in our experience we and many of our colleagues, friends, and students respond positively to a variety of music. There is an emotional resonance which we connect with, however, and sometimes this can lead to extreme feelings & responses (positive & negative).

Homer's DJ Idioms:

25% prefer mostly/all traditional, 25% prefer mostly/all Alternative, 50% are ok either way.

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Be "transparent" and "consistent" with your Event/DJing

Transparent - Your event is clearly defined & promoted

Consistent - You provide a similar experience each time

Class Music Focus

Important to decide what music to play for your class.

Golden Age (traditional music) has been fleshed out thoroughly. Usually, only the best music & recordings have made it to our DJ laptops.

We now have a body of 'Old School Alternative' classics but still have room for exploring new songs. Preferences vary based on culture and language...
